A rare Specimen Medalllic "Pavilion"



A rare **Specimen Medalllic "Pavilion" Dollar** sold for a record \$576,000 USD to lead **Heritage Auctions'** World & Ancient Coins Platinum Session and Signature Auction to \$7,969,537 December 7-9. The price paid for the Republic Hsu Shih-chang Specimen "Pavilion" Medalllic Dollar Year 10 (1921) SP63 PCGS, from the **Ta Han Collection**, set a new record for a silver Pavilion Dollar; the prior record was set in October 2021, when a European firm sold an example for approximately \$285,000. "This is the first Medalllic

'Pavilion' issue without lower legend we have offered at Heritage Auctions in the last five years, and the condition is extraordinary – the second-finest of all examples in the conditional census-es," says **Cris Bierrenbach**, "It is believed this coin was created for distribution upon the opening of the Peking Union Medical College, the façade of which appears on the reverse." A Republic Yuan Shih-kai "Plumed Hat" Dollar ND (1916) MS66+ PCGS, or "**Flying Dragon Dollar**," sold for \$312,000. Struck for the inauguration of **Yuan Shih-kai** as Emperor **Hung-hsien**, it features a reverse dragon motif that remains expertly engraved, symbolizing the military leader's ascension to the imperial throne. Only six examples have received a higher grade from either grading service. A Hupeh. Kuang-hsü "Small Characters" Tael Year 30 (1904) MS62 PCGS, Wuchang mint, KM-Y128.2, L&M-180, Kann-933, WS-0878, from the **Tony Ma Collection**, drew a winning bid of \$240,000. Few examples from this coveted series equal the level of aesthetic quality seen in this extraordinary example, leaving an impression of visual balance that renders this offering a highly collectible representative of this type. The only certified example of an 1889 Kwangtung Copper Pattern 50 Cents, from the **Monrovia Collection**, prompted 24 bids before it brought \$132,000 – more than four times its high pre-auction estimate. This coin is exceptionally scarce in a comparable state of preservation as the circulation issue, and almost unseen as a Pattern struck in copper. **China** was outfitted with presses and dies to strike its first milled issues in 1889; these 50 Cent issues, with English legends to the obverse (reverse as holdered), were among the first products from this minting facility and are among the finest products of **Kwangtung** origin.

General Charistics SILVER

Silver is considered a precious metal and was one of the earliest metals known to humans. Silver has been used as a form of currency by more people throughout history than any other metal, even gold. Silver was first discovered about 4000 B.C. Today silver is mostly used for silverware, silver goods, and coins, there is evidence that silver utensils and ornaments have been found in ancient tombs of Chaldea, Mesopotamia, Egypt, China, Persia, and Greece. In 1993, Mexico was the world's largest producer of silver and the United States was the second leading producer, followed by Canada, Australia, Spain, Peru, and Russia. That year, worldwide production of silver from mines totaled 548.2 million ounces. Most of the silver used in the world today is for industrial purposes, and the United States is the leading buyer. Other top consumers include Japan, India, and eastern European countries. Silver is the whitest metallic element. It is rare, strong, corrosion resistant, and unaffected by moisture, vegetable acids, or alkalis. Silver is also resonant, moldable, malleable, and possesses the highest thermal and electric conductivity of any substance. The chemical symbol for silver is Ag, which means white and shining. Silver does not react to many chemicals but it does react with sulfur, which is present in the air. The reaction causes silver to tarnish; it must be polished periodically to retain its luster. Silver possesses many special physical characteristics and qualities that make it very useful. The photography industry is the largest user of silver compounds. Silver forms the most light-sensitive salts, or halides, which are needed to develop high-quality photography. Silver has the highest electrical conductivity per unit volume of any metal, including copper, so it is used often in electronics.

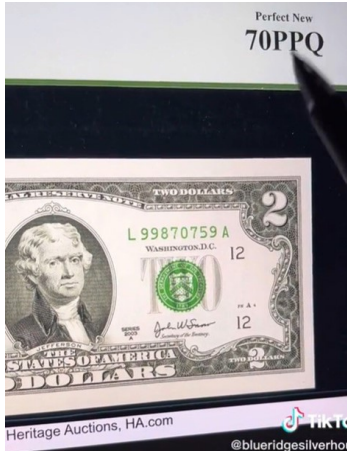

A CRISP, \$2 bill could be worth over \$1,000 - and it doesn't even need any special markings or mistakes. Shaun



In a recent video, he profiled a 2003 \$2 bill that sold for an astounding \$1,200 at a Heritage Auction back in October of this year. Even more remarkably, the bill did not have any noticeable serial number or design errors that often make bills and coins valuable. Instead, this bill's claim to fame is its pristine condition. It is certified 70PPQ, the highest possible rating for a banknote. 70PPQ is reserved for uncirculated bills that not only show little to no signs of handling but also have a perfectly aligned design, according to expert rare coin and banknote rating agency PCGS. "For a banknote to grade 70, it must be perfectly centered to the unaided eye with full margins for the issue; the registration must also be aligned perfectly. There cannot be any handling marks or imperfections in the print quality of the entirety of the banknote," reads a [description by PCGS](#). Shaun pointed out that a note's condition can make it very valuable regardless of other more notable characteristics. "That's just proof that you don't need a fancy serial number, a mule, or a web note...for a note to be a lot of money," he said.

The Royal Canadian Mint's Black Toonie Goes Into Circulation in Canada

Honoring the late Queen Elizabeth II

On top of releasing the world's first [diamond-shaped coin](#), [The Royal Canadian Mint](#) continues to captivate coin collectors with its inventive releases. Its next circulation [coin](#) is no different as it takes [Canada's](#) two-dollar coin aka The Toonie and gives it a special chemical treatment that turns the nickel black. This black Toonie is set to commemorate [Queen Elizabeth II](#) and her 70 years as head of state of Canada, and the black ring is representative of a mourning armband. This commemorative coin has just started to make its way into banks across the country and an estimated five million are set to be stamped.

CROWN GOLD

There are many different types of gold and the quality of gold can greatly affect the value. This is the reason that if you are considering investing, selling, or buying gold, there are many different things that you should keep in mind when it comes to the quality of gold and its value. For example, one of the most popular types of gold is referred to as crown gold. This is 22kt gold alloy that was originally introduced by England for the use of gold coins that were manufactured in 1526 by Henry VIII. There were several different reasons that the decision to utilize 22kt gold alloy rather than the 23kt gold that was used previously. The first and main reason was due to the incredible wear properties of the gold. This is because the 22kt gold does not wear intentionally as much as the 23kt gold that was soft and often invited filing. When it comes to the alloying metal, copper is usually used and silver is used sometimes. Crown gold is still in used by the British gold sovereign, which is still minted to this day. Before the mid twentieth century the gold coins that were produced were meant to be used as currency when in circulation. However its important to note that even though the crown gold coins are no longer used as a form of currency, the quality of the gold that is used in the coins will still greatly affect there value when they are exchanged for paper money. This is something that you are going to want to think about when it comes to valuing your gold or crown gold.
